**Summary:** John Brown served in the 18th Btn from 30 Jan 1915. His mother was a widow with two other sons in service, and since they ran a farm, it was by his mother's permission that he was allowed to join up. He became a machine gunner and served with the 4th Brigade Canadian Machine Gun Corps. He was killed in action during the attack on Vimy Ridge 9th of April 1917. His memory is continued on the Vimy Memorial. He also appears on the Strathroy cenotaph.

## The Age May 3 1917

### MOUNT CARMEL.

Sad news was received on Sunday last by Mrs. Brown that her sor, John, had been killed in action somewhere in France on April 9th after being at the front for two and a half years. Deceased was among the first of the Canadian boys to answer the call. He was a fine type of young manhood, a good soldier and had beer promoted some time 320 from the ranks as a result of his valor. He was well-krown in this community, and highly respected. Mrs. Brown is a widow and has two other sons in the war. Robt. who enlisted in the North West, is slowly recovering from the effects of a gas attack and Leonard is with the Middlesex boys, who were recently reported in the thick of the fighting.

#### MOUNT CARMEL

Corporal John Brown was among the first from this neighborhood to hear the call to arms. To him it was no open road to pleasure and a good time. He felt that duty demanded that he offer his life to his country as an aid to stem the tide of Prussianism that would overwhelm, if it could, the liberties of our country and the world. He crossed the sea with the 18th Battalion in the fall of 1915 and since that time, has been almost continuously in the trenches. In the attack on Vimy Ridge, April 9th, he fell. On Sunday, May 13th, an appropriate memorial service was held in the Mt. Carmel Methodist church. The service was conducted by the pastor, Rev. Mr. Reycraft who chose as his text, the words: "And he said, What hast thou done? The voice of thy brother's blood crieth unto me from the ground." No sacrifice, said Mr. Reycraft, ever went unnoticed either for the one who made it or for those who suffer with them. He commended highly those who so freely sacrificed all their prospects in order to defend their country. Those who talk so glibly about the necessity of increased food production, demanding that we give up the sanctity of our Sabbath, came in for a scathing denunciation. The speaker character-ized them as "Sham patriots who were afraid to soil their hands." The large attendance testified to the high esteem in which Corp. Brown was held in his home neighborhood. The sympathy of all his friends goes out to his mother, who in the midst of her great sorrow still has the assurance that he passed beyond nobly "doing his bit."
